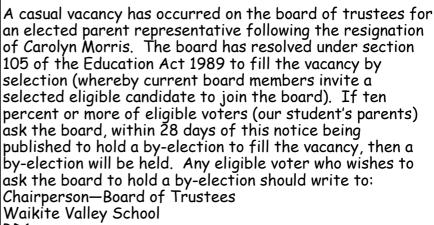
Board of Trustees Update

What is bullying?

Bullying is something that happens in our communities. So what is bullying? Bullying is when someone is physically hurt, but it can also be when someone is verbally insulted. An important thing to remember is that it is only bullying when it happens more than once or twice. Something mean is not bullying but it is still wrong, but bullying is if it happens repeatedly.

Bullying affects all of us. Many different people can be harmed or part of it. You may be the bully and later on you may feel bad after. If you are the one getting bullied you may get hurt, or feel bad from nasty comments or e-mails.

Bullying takes many different forms. Physical bullying is when you kick, hit punch or hurt someone. Cyber bullying is like verbal bullying, but online. It can be when you get sent mean e-mails, images and comments. Bullying is when someone says something mean or nasty, that's verbally bullying. Social or relational bullying is about spreading rumours, gossiping and pulling faces. The different ways people bully are physical through hitting or kicking, verbal is when someone says something mean or nasty, social through gossip, and cyber is when someone is mean online or using social media.

There are many reasons why bullying happens. Bullying can happen when the bully is having a bad day or it can be that the person is trying to find out where they stand in their social group. They may have seen it in their family. They may be trying to impress someone. Or they may be trying not to get bullied by being the bully.

There are a lot of ways each of us can make a difference. In some instances you may be able to step in, but don't put yourself at risk. You could go get an adult or you can just walk away or say that it is wrong. Just make sure you don't get hurt and that you don't encourage the behaviour.

I hope that if you have read this you will think before you act and do be careful. Make sure you don't get caught up in the crossfire. And if you are the one getting bullied make sure to tell an adult.
