Believe it or not the end of the term is coming up!


School finishes for Term 1 on Thursday 13th April (start of Easter) and Term 2 starts on Monday 1st May.

Special Character Clipboard:

St Patrick's Feast Day- March 17



St. Patrick of <u>Ireland</u> is one of the world's most popular saints. Patrick was born around 385 in Scotland, probably Kilpatrick. As a boy of fourteen or so, he was captured during a raiding party and taken to <u>Ireland</u> as a slave to herd and tend sheep. <u>Ireland</u> at this <u>time</u> was a land of Druids and pagans. During his captivity, he turned to <u>God</u> in prayer.

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from <u>God</u> in which he was told to leave <u>Ireland</u> by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain, where he reunited with his family. He had another dream in which the people of <u>Ireland</u> were calling out to him. He began his studies for the priesthood. Later, Patrick was ordained a bishop, and was sent to take the Gospel to Ireland. He arrived in <u>Ireland</u> March 25, 433, and began preaching the Gospel throughout Ireland, converting many. He and his disciples preached and converted thousands and began building churches all over the country.

Why a shamrock? Patrick used the shamrock to explain the Trinity, and has been associated with him and the Irish since that time.

We have been busy over the past couple of weeks doing Progress Achievement Testing in Punctuation and Grammar, and Listening. These standardised tests are used to track student achievement over time, as well as inform us of the kinds of teaching materials, methods and programmes that are most suitable for our students.



The children have been very positive in their attitude and effort during this time of testing, and they will be bringing their results home next week, to share with their parents.



Our **Bees! Bees! Bees!** research questions will also be coming home soon, so that parents and families can help the students extend their understanding of these fascinating creatures. Each child has decided on an area of interest that they would like to investigate and the students will be using a range of research skills and then their own choice of presentation style to show their learning to their peers.

Senior Class News:

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Right now is a good time to make a choice!

The **Central Otago triathlon** is being held next Thursday and the competing children are excited. I wish them all the best of luck. They have committed to try their best, and to have a positive attitude. This is a great experience for the kids, and although they will be nervous – their sense of achievement at the end will be satisfying.

A few guidelines for the day are...

- 1. Take plenty of food and water.
- 2. Wear and take clothing appropriate for cold weather, and hot weather (school sports top and fleece top, your own shorts / bikeshorts, trackpants, togs / towel for swimmers, bike and helmet for cyclists, sneakers for runners).
- 3. Be there in good time.
- 4. Parents of those children getting a ride with someone else, please phone the driver to find out where and what time you are to meet them.

Most children are in a good routine with **homework** – thankyou parents for making this happen. Earlier this week I spoke with a group of children about what they would like in terms of help at home with reading. Some of their comments are below...

- Help me sound out new words, and help me find out what they mean
- Ask me questions about what I am reading
- Listen carefully to me, and encourage and praise me
- Read to me sometimes, we could take turns.

There has been some dishonesty around homework with children saying they had read something, and they haven't. Please support your child to be honest, and to honestly complete their homework. This is not for my benefit or yours, its to support their learning and to grow their skills.

In relation to a reading activity that a group did last week, we have been investigating how much sleep we have been getting. On the whole the children are doing ok, but sleep is so important to allow for bright, alert and positive children – ready to face my daily school challenges! The recommended amount of sleep for a child in this class is 9-11 hours, and out of interest 7-9 hours for adults.

Statistics NZ is running a **Census at Schools** activity this year, which we will complete next term. They send me little emails of information, and the latest one caught my interest. It was based around how much screen time children have outside of school hours (TV, Computer, phone, laptop). It made me think about our habits at my own home!

Students were asked if, on a school day, there was a limit on the amount of screen time they had at home. Just 16% of high-school students and 37% of primary school students reported a limit. For those with limits, primary schoolers were allowed a median of an hour (the median is the middle amount in the range reported) and secondary students two hours.

Students were asked how often their screen time was supervised - with supervised meaning a parent or caregiver was watching or was in the same room as the child. Four in 10 primary schoolers said "a little," and two in 10 "usually." More than half of high school students said they were never supervised, with a further three in 10 saying they were supervised "a little."

These are the Ministry of Education guidelines for children and young people (5–18 years) Children and young people should:

- Throughout each day, do 60 minutes or more of moderate to vigorous physical activity
- Be active in as many ways as possible, for example, through play, cultural activities, dance, sport, recreation, jobs and going from place to place
- Be active with friends and whānau, at home, school and in their communities
- Spend less than 2 hours a day (out of school hours) in front of the television, computers, and game consoles.
