Snow Day Procedure

Procedure in the event of snow/icy conditions.

In the morning, if school is closed, or if any of the buses are running late – a notice will be broadcast on the local radio station Burn 729AM/87.9FM.

If there is reason to send bus children home early during the day, parents will be contacted and notified of the time of departure for buses. If we are unable to contact any parent/caregiver, then those children will remain at school until parents can come and collect them.

Decisions on buses and conditions are made by the Bus Controller at Maniototo Area School, in conjunction with bus drivers.

This week is the second anniversary of Pope Francis's Document "Laudato Si". Thank you to the **parents** who are able to come in each day to **help** us with our Literacy programme. We are very busy each morning with learning activities in Handwriting, Spelling, Vocabulary, Personal Writing, Oral Language and Guided Reading. It is great to have an extra pair of hands, ears and eyes, to give the students as much support as possible while they learn.

Our "Quick Write" programme is a daily opportunity for children to write on a visual or written prompt that challenges them to think outside the box. We discuss the prompt, I record any vocabulary they would like to use in their writing on the whiteboard and then the students have a 10 minute time period in which to write. Their audience are each other, but I thought you might enjoy some of the more "out-there" samples!

Current classroom learning

Maths: Our focus is on fractions, decimals and percentages which involves lots of specific vocabulary, and being able to visualise what these would look like. Your children will be practicing this on Mathletics, and may need your support with this as they build their knowledge bank.

RE: Jesus and how he is a role model to us.

Topic: The 'Magnificant Maniototo': history, industry and our culture.

Reading: Continuing building our comprehension through close reading and comprehension. Building our reading mileage by reading for pleasure each day in our homework.

Writing: Developing a clear writing structure, that is logical and flows. We are selecting words to inform, entertain and give the reader a sense of what the characters are feeling.
