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A Community Update from

the Eltham School Board of Trustees

Dear Parents, Whanau and members of the Eltham School Community

Since the beautiful school arches at the west entrance to the school are nearing completion, and with landscaping improvements to the grounds made by our school's wonderful new gardener, the Board has recognised the need for a retaining wall at the front of the school between the gates and the arches.

One of our street trees and its roots are located where the retaining wall is required. Recent works in this area by the Council to repair the footpath due to root damage have also highlighted the need to deal with this landscaping issue. Finally, we have also discovered that the roots of this tree have started to encroach on cabling and power supply to the school.

The Board of Trustees therefore got expert advice from two local arborists to explore options to preserve the tree while managing the spread of its roots. We were advised that the roots could not be trimmed or managed without making the tree unsafe, and that the roots would likely pose an ongoing problem for the School and the Council.

We confirmed that the tree is not one of our Memorial trees, and is not native. The Board therefore accepted the expert advice to remove the tree and its roots. The other larger beautiful tree next to the arches will remain as its growth habit does not interfere with its surroundings.

The Board of Trustees will be replacing the problem tree with two decorative trees in honour of the STESA Committee who preserved our School arches. Removal of the old tree, stump grinding and establishment of the new trees will be funded by the Board of Trustees. The tree will be removed during the school holidays due to safety reasons.

We are looking for recommendations from the Community on types of decorative trees that would beautify the front of our school and the streetscape of Conway Road.

If you would like to recommend a replacement tree or have concerns about the removal of our problem tree, please let us know.
