

National Standards Update

Our school believes New Zealand parents will have better information about their children's learning in future following the Government's decision to scrap National Standards and require reporting to parents across the full curriculum.

Rather than being required to report only on whether children are above, at, below or well below National Standards in reading, writing and maths, schools will be free to report much richer information about your child's progress and success.

Our school believes this will have a hugely positive influence on children's learning. Several studies have shown that over time, National Standards have caused a narrowing of focus in New Zealand schools and an increase in student anxiety leading to negative impacts on children's attitudes to learning. We look forward to reporting on the full breadth of the New Zealand Curriculum, as schools did before the Standards were introduced by the National Government in 2010.


