BUILDING A RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN WAIKITE VALLEY SCHOOL AND JOHN PAUL COLLEGE

As many of you will remember, when I arrived at our school in 2014 there were no students in Years 7 and 8. Over the past 3 years the staff, BOT and community of our school have worked hard to find out why families were moving their children to other schools early and what we can do to ensure that our school meets the needs and aspirations of our community. It is a huge credit to us all that we have had an intermediate class with 9 students in Year 7-8 for the past 2 years. However, we are still aware that some families are leaving before their children complete their full primary schooling at Waikite Valley School.

After ongoing conversations with families, we have learned that one of the main reasons for the early shift is a concern that the children will not be accepted to John Paul College at Year 9 because of a lack of spaces. Over the past couple of years I have been working with the Principal of JPC, Patrick Walsh, on how we can form a positive relationship that ensures the students of Waikite Valley can get the 'best of both worlds'. The main focus of this collaboration is to assure parents that they are best to stay at Waikite Valley School for as long as is possible to take full advantage of our school's

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

Teaching our student's 'how to fish'......

There's an old saying, usually attributed to Confucius, that goes "Give a man a fish, and you'll feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you've fed him for a lifetime." There's an important life lesson in that simple statement.



The explanation that guides our school curriculum is something like:

Give a student the answer, and they'll only have a temporary solution. Teach them the principles that led you to that answer, and they will be able to create their own solutions in the future.

It is my opinion (and observation) that formal education at times consists of nothing more than making children memorize answers, sometimes in abstract contexts, ignoring the importance of teaching them how to get to those answers in the first place or how to critique whether finding the answer is the most important part for their learning.

As teachers and parents it is important to think about how we respond to the many (and varied) questions our children ask us. Should we answer them with a direct answer? Should we ask them to explain what they think about it? Is it best to answer their question with a question to deepen their thinking? Or sometimes perhaps it is good to simply say that you don't know. The way we interact with our children can really help build a flexible mindset, which is invaluable for being a lifelong learner!

First Lego League International Tournament



December 2017 a group of our Year 7-8 students took part in the National Lego League Robotics tournament and finished in 3rd Place overall. This qualified them for an international tournament place—which we are extremely excited to announce that we have been invited to compete at the First Lego League International Open, held in LEGOLAND Carlsbad, California, USA from May 18-20, 2018. We are invited to take a team with 4 members and

2 coaches. The robots that we work with will need hours of programming and fine-tuning to ensure they can achieve a high number of scoring runs. Our project based around water solutions will also need more research and improved presentation. Along with our time commitment we will also be working hard to raise the funds for the trip. We estimate that we will need \$15000 to cover all costs. We are hoping to gain sponsorship to assist with the cost—it is a real achievement to be invited to compete at this and the experience will be one the students remember for their lifetime. This will also feed into the Robotics program at our school, through the ideas that they gather while watching and talking to other teams at the tournament. Congratulations to the team and good luck with the learning and financial challenges to get them there! Let me know if you have any ideas to support their journey.

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
