
Community Award

All of our 'minor' behavioral incidents are handled by teachers. Senior management gets involved with major behavioral issues. If a child presents 3 minor incidents for the same thing, for example they elbow someone in their class to get their attention repeatedly, and they have already been told by their teacher not to do this, then they will be given the same consequence as a major behaviour. Eg Time Out.

If your child has to do a "Time Out" this means they lose their lunch-time and have to sit in the DP's or Principal's office for the duration of the lunch break. (30 minutes)
