FRIENDS OF LUMSDEN SCHOOL

Friends of Lumsden School (FoLS) is the parent body of Lumsden School and it is an integral part of the organisation of our school.

FoLS was set up in 2013 to allow the Board of Trustees (BOT) to focus on their governance role, and staff to focus on their teaching. Areas such as fundraising, minor catering, working bees and grounds maintenance are all taken care of by FoLS and this leaves BOT and staff more time to carry out their core roles of Governance and Management/teaching and learning. FoLS also aims to foster inter-connection between the school and school families (e.g. parent coffee and catch ups before assembly; family/school social events).

Every parent at our school is considered part of FoLS, and there is an expectation that families contribute to some of the work undertaken by FoLS — the old adage of 'many hands make light work' is most certainly true. As part of this help, families are expected to 'put their name' to an area of the school that they would like to help with. These areas are organised on a roster/delegatory system where coordinators have their team of 'helpers' for each area. The following outlines these areas:

- Catering/BBQs Supplying a plate for occasional morning teas or assisting with BBQ at school events
- Grounds/Garden Seasonal work, spraying, weeding, raking, etc. When a large amount of
 work is required in this area a school Working Bee is called and then this is the
 responsibility of all families.
- Maintenance Small fix it jobs chairs, furniture, playground.

Lawnmowing (of a very small portion of the grounds close to the school buildings) will be undertaken by all parents on a roster-type system (maybe one turn every 2-3 years?). It is important to take your turn when the time comes. Similarly, **Fundraising** will be done by all families when the need arises.

We have a FoLS running committee that meets 5 - 6 times a year and they help steer the group in the right direction. We would love to see as many faces as possible at these meetings which are advertised in the school newsletter.

FiNSCoL News Update June 2018

> Professional Development

Professional Development for all FiNSCoL schools is now happening 'on the ground', with Using Technology Better (UTB) facilitators working with and across schools between now and the end of the year to facilitate teacher development within the context of Digital learning. This will not only assist with readiness for the implementation of the new Digital Technology Curriculum in 2019, but also help provide a vehicle for teachers to provide new and inspiring contexts for learning for our students.

Meanwhile, an application has been made to the MoE for an additional 400 hours, which if successful, will enable us to continue the momentum with our CoL-wide PLD throughout 2019.

> FiNSCoL Framework

A draft of this key document has almost been completed. It is designed to help us all be rowing our boat together in the same direction in terms of our 'Why, What, How' practices as a CoL. It includes: Our Purpose, Vision and Beliefs; Management and Structure; Role Definitions and Job Descriptions; Succession Plan; Communications Plan; FiNSCoL Protocols; Three-year Strategic Plan; Achievement Challenges; Financial Plan/Budget; Memorandum of Agreement. This draft will be discussed at our next FiNSCoL team meeting at the end of this term.

> Stewardship Group

Jason Herrick, a Northern Southland College board member has replaced Lisa Elder on this team, joining Lynlee Smith and Andrew Watson (Co-Lead Principals), Grant Excell (Principal of Te Anau School), and Robert Kempthorne (Mararoa School BoT). The stewardship group's first duty was to make the appointments of our ASTs. The group will be meeting early in Term 3 as we review our progress and finalise our new Strategic Plan.

> Across- School Teacher Appointments

Since the appointment of Chloe Madden (Lumsden School) and Jennah Hughes (Fiordland College) to the two .02 AST positions, they have kick-started their work by visiting each FiNSCoL school to listen to their principals and/or leadership teams talk about things like their schools' strengths, needs, foci, and aspirations which they have of the CoL. This will be of major benefit as they not only understand common threads across our schools, but also what is special to each school and what each school 'holds dear'. This kind of knowledge will be invaluable as they collaborate with teachers across FiNSCoL.

Chloe and Jennah have also commenced their 'Emerging Leaders' professional development, supported by Janelle Stevenson of Evaluation Associates.

Within School Teacher Appointments

Five of our entitled eight Within-School teachers have been appointed — Congratulations to Shelley Wilson and Dan Waldie from Fiordland College; Kate Excell and Diana McGlade from Te Anau Primary and Wendy Coghlan from Northern Southland College. At present there are two letters sitting with the Secretary of Education, Iona Holstead, requesting a variation of the eligibility 'rules' restricting applicants to have a 0.8 or more current teaching component, and ruling out the ability of principals to apply. We are hoping that, once more the MoE will recognise the challenges posed by their tight criteria for appointees, in terms of the smallness of our schools, and our far-flung geography.

Once these appointments have been completed, a WST induction day has been planned to help lay a springboard for these teachers' work in their schools.

> Early Childhood Liaison

We are very pleased to welcome on board two Early Childhood Education representatives, Vanessa Hamilton (Lumsden Play Centre) and Claire Shaw (Fiordland Kindergarten). Vanessa and Claire will be joining us at our FiNSCoL meetings, and we know that their input will be invaluable, especially as we strive towards helping our children on a learning pathway which is smoothly paved with seamless and successful transitions.

> CoL Lead Principal and AST Forum in Christchurch

Lynlee, Andrew, Chloe and Jennah attended this on May 30, meeting with CoL leaders from across the South Island. The day was focussed around 'Building Collegial Learning'. There was some particularly useful information about moving away from "Achievement Challenge" focus, and moving to a "Learning Framework" focus, where we were challenged to think about a shift away from purely academic goals being at the forefront of what we do, to the kinds of skills and attributes that are important and relevant for all students to learn. This will be useful as we take a look at our current achievement challenges, and re-frame them into a working document where aspiration rather than 'compliance' is the main driver.

> Self Review

Recently Steve Edwards, our Expert partner, took us through a CoL Development Map to help us identify what stage of development we are 'at', under six different domains. This will be a useful tool to revisit twice-yearly to review our progress and identify next steps for development. We will be sharing this at our next Leaders Meeting (June 28) and with the Stewardship Group in Term 3.

School-Wide

INFORMATION SHEET FOR PARENTS & CAREGIVERS: POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING (PB4L) SCHOOL-WIDE

As parents/caregivers and teachers, we often assume that kids know what's expected of them and how to behave. When they don't, we notice and we react. When they do behave, we might sometimes notice, but do we say anything to them? To our kids, it can all seem a bit random.

PB4L School-Wide takes the 'random' out of it. When your kids are in school, no matter who is teaching them or where they are in the school, they will know what behaviour is expected of them. They will feel supported to get it right and they will be acknowledged when they do.

WHAT IS PB4L SCHOOL-WIDE?

PB4L School-Wide helps your school to build an environment that encourages and supports positive behaviour and deters bullying. It takes 3-5 years to put in place, but once the planning is done, you'll start to see small changes in the way things work.

So, what can you expect to see?

1. Information gathering

Your school will gather information about behaviour incidents in the school and put a School-Wide team together.

2. Behaviour expectations

The team will identify 3-5 behaviour expectations (what you might call rules). The school will then get creative and come up with ways to show these around the school. Your child or young person will know very clearly what's expected of them.

3. Teaching behaviours

Your child or young person will be taught the behaviours that are expected of them (just as they're taught other subjects).

4. Recognising positive behaviour

Your child or young person will be acknowledged (perhaps even rewarded) when they get it right (no doubt you'll hear about this at home).

5. Responding to unwanted behaviour

There will be consistent, fair and equitable consequences when your child or young person doesn't get it right and they will be re-taught the expectations.

HOW YOU CAN BE INVOLVED

- Look for regular updates from your school about what they are doing.
- Look into becoming a parent representative on the School-Wide team
- Take up any opportunities to provide input into the values of the school
- Can you provide rewards or suggestions of how to praise the students (eg homemade products or products from a local business)?
- Take an interest in what your child or young person is learning at school
- Give feedback on any surveys or information your school shares with families and whanau about behaviour and PB4L.

IDEAS - SUPPORTING PB4L AT HOME

- Ask your school for a parent workshop about PB4L and behaviour
- Talk with your family about what the school's values might look like at home
- Recognise (praise and encourage) your children when they show these behaviours at home
- Tell the school of any changes you see in your children

If your child or young person is still experiencing challenges with their behaviour, your school will look at supports at the next level – for groups of students or individual students. They will look at what might be behind the behaviour and provide more support such as social skills clubs, mentors or behaviour plans.

SOME BASIC PB4L BEHAVIOUR PRINCIPLES

Positive behaviour can be taught

One of the main traps adults fall into when responding to behaviour in children and young people is that we assume they know how to behave. The truth is, they don't. They need us as adults to:

- clearly communicate what we want to see
- recognise them when they get it right (with rewards, encouragement and praise)
- teach them how to do what is expected of them (tell, show, model, practice, be creative and make it fun)
- use their 'getting it wrong' as an opportunity to re-teach them and support them to get it right.

USEFUL TIP: Start a sentence with what you want your kids to do ("Please do this ... in this way..." rather than not do "Don't do this...").

Behaviour is a form of communication

Behaviour serves a purpose or communicates a need. The two most common purposes of behaviour are to:

- get peer or adult attention, a desired object or activity or sensory stimulation (a behaviour will be more likely to happen again if something [object or event] is given after the behaviour occurs)
- avoid a difficult, boring or easy task, a
 physical demand, an activity the child or
 young person doesn't like, or a peer
 (a behaviour will be more likely to happen
 again if something [object or event] is
 avoided, escaped or removed after the
 behaviour occurs).

Address the need the behaviour is communicating

Too often we try to manage the what of the behaviour rather than its purpose - the why.

- If we understand what a child or young person is trying to communicate, we can teach them a different (more positive) way of getting their needs met.
- If we can anticipate what it is that they need, we can eliminate the need for the behaviour altogether.

Behaviour is controlled (weakened or reinforced) by what happens after it (consequences)

The way we respond to behaviour makes that behaviour more or less likely to occur again. For example, if we remove a child from the room or an activity when they have tantrums to avoid work, we are increasing the chances of the behaviour happening again.

THE PLACE OF DISCIPLINE IN PB4L SCHOOL-WIDE

You might have noticed the word 'discipline' doesn't feature much in PB4L School-Wide. That doesn't mean we've gone soft on kids. There are still consequences and they are still responsible for their actions. But before the consequences kick in, we give kids a fair chance of meeting our expectations by being clear about what they are, supporting them to get it right, and giving constant reminders, prompts and encouragement. We let them know that we believe in them. It's our job as adults to create an opportunity for them to do it right so that we can praise them for it. Once they get that first 'thanks, well done' from us, they'll want it again and again.
