At Picton School we serve a broad community of diverse educational needs. To support the teachers, the Board of Trustees and Principal employ a highly skilled and experienced team of Teacher Aides (TA). Picton School has recently worked through some changes in this area. We have reviewed our Teacher Aide provisions in an attempt to balance the books, as our expenditure was well in excess of the existing considerable budget. Picton School was providing a lot more TA hours than a comparable school and therefore spending a considerable proportion of our School Budget.

The Board of Trustees (BoT), Senco Teacher and Principal have worked together to provide a plan to fully support our children. These changes will take effect on the 20th August. No one likes change, but change can be effective and timely. Through the plan, we provide full time cover for our high needs students and flexible cover for other students with learning and behavioural needs across the school. The new plan still provides more Teacher Aide time than a comparable school. The BoT are committed to providing a sustainable plan to support the educational aspirations of our learning community.

I would like to welcome another member of staff to Picton School in Term 3. Sue Riches is our new administrator (Office Person). Sue is a highly experienced administrator who has moved into the region from Christchurch. Please make her feel welcome to her new job and to Picton. Sue started at the beginning of this week, learning the ropes from Dianne who is retiring on Friday, after being at Picton School for 16 months.

Make sure you pop in before Friday as you might miss the opportunity to say goodbye to Dianne. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Dianne for maintaining a steady hand in such a busy office and organising so much behind the scenes, for what is a very vibrant, little school. I would like to personally thank Dianne for making my transition to Picton School so painless.

House Groups

This term the school has started a new school-wide rewards system.

Children earn Values Cards from teachers by demonstrating the Picton School Values. There are five different Values Cards: Curiosity / Engagement, Independence, Leadership, Resilience and Showing Respect.

Each time a child gets a Values Card they place it in their House Box to be counted for House Points (5 points for a card). All the cards are then placed into one box and two are drawn out every Assembly to win a prize (replacing the Caring Kiwi). House Captains announce the amount of points earned.

There is also a ladder on display in the foyer showing how many Values Cards the whole school has earned and the progress made towards a school-wide reward. The reward levels are:

200 = Extra long lunch time.

600 = Treasure Hunt or Afternoon Disco (to be voted on). 1000 = Wet and Wild Afternoon or Free Sausage Sizzle (to be voted on).

This scheme is already proving to be popular and successful with 107 cards earned in just the first week of term! 3 of these were earned by Kaipupu House, 28 by Waitohi, 26 by Totaranui and 23 by Arapaoa.

In the competition for the House Shield Kaipupu lead with 325 points with Waitohi on 287, Totaranui on 273 and Arapaoa on 253. It is early days though and everyone is in it to win it!
