# Strike Action 15<sup>th</sup> August

A nation-wide strike for teachers and principals is scheduled for 15<sup>th</sup> August. Members have voted that this will be a full day strike.

The reason for the strike is that we as an education sector believe that key issues are not being addressed: increasingly high workloads, lack of support for students with additional learning and behavioural needs, and undervaluing of the profession.

These are issues which directly affect our children's learning, and the decision to take strike action reflects the importance and urgency of this situation, given that progress has not been made as a result of previous negotiations.

Why get in behind the campaign? New Zealand has a problem. Enrolments in teacher training have dropped 40% between 2010 and 2016 while there are growing school rolls. Since the early 2000s teacher salaries have dropped significantly relative to the median NZ salary from 1.8 times the median (for experienced teachers on the top of the pay scale) to just over 1.5. In effect, this means jobs that used to earn less than teachers now earn more.

We understand that the strike will obviously mean some disruption to families, as we will be asking parents to make arrangements for children not to be at school during the strike period. We appreciate your support, and I will keep you in the loop as soon as arrangements have been finalised.

Our hope is a successful campaign will mean that the Ministry of Education will deliver staffing and resourcing improvements to all schools to better help children reach their potentials, and curb the crisis in teacher recruitment and retention.
