


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Dear Parents/Carers

Three Way Conferences

These are attended by the student, teacher and parent/carer/whanau members. It is an important time for each child as it gives them the opportunity of discussing their learning, their progress and future goals. I know from experience that the child and teachers are very disappointed when the child is not given this opportunity to share their learning stories. Usually we only have a few children, if any, who miss out and we appreciate the time the whanau puts into organising getting here and being involved in the conference. If the times and dates do not suit we always arrange another time that does.

We know that a child cannot learn in isolation, they need the support of staff, but more importantly, they need the support of their family. It is in working together, home and school, that we can improve the opportunities for each child.

We also see how a child's self-esteem is increased when both teachers and parents understand and respond to the child's strengths, goals and interests.

Cheap Internet - A great opportunity

Spark Jump helps eligible families with children under 18 learn online at home for \$10 for 30GB. It's a low cost, prepaid internet service for families with children under 18 who currently have no WiFi connection. This is a 20/20 Trust initiative. More Information:

Ski Camp

It was great that we were able to provide all our Year 7 and 8 children with the opportunity of a 3 day Tukino Ski Camp. Thank you to those groups and individuals who contributed funding so that all tamariki could attend. The weather for skiing for two days couldn't have been better, and the accommodation, ski field (close to the Lodge) and lodge personnel were amazing. On the day of our return we were also able to fit in a visit to the hot pools as the weather had deteriorated and the ski field was closed. This will be a school experience that the children will remember forever. A special thanks to Rhea, Leigh and Peanut (with her bus) for being our accompanying adults.

Teacher Strike

Wednesday 15th August is a principal and teacher strike day. The Board of Trustees has made the decision to close the school. There will be no teaching staff on the school site. Please refer to the board's latest information regarding the strike day.

Reasons for the teachers going on strike: We are presently facing a crisis in education with a present 40% drop in people training to be teachers alongside a growing number of school aged children. Young people are not choosing teaching as an option because they are not attracted by the pay, hours of work, paper-work, job satisfaction.... A third of our young teachers are only staying up to 5 years before they leave the profession. A further third of our teachers are retiring within the next 5 year. A pay jolt in salaries may help to address the shortage. Many of our local schools are already finding teaching positions and relief teachers hard to fill.

Our children with diverse special needs are on the increase and we need more support and resources for them. Our SENCOs (Special Needs Co-ordinator) are not provided with any release time for this increasing need. We are also very underfunded for teacher aides, lack the necessary outside school support, and many of our children are not being recognised for assistance when they have high learning and behaviour needs.

Time at School

A reminder that it is illegal for children not to be at school unless there is a very good reason. We often have to indicate on the register that children are absent, or late, as being unjustified. Several of our children have very poor attendance and/or lateness on their school record. It is up to parents/carers to have children at school at the start of the day 5 minutes before 9am and to finish the day at 3pm. We recommend children arrive some time after 8.30am so that they can settle into the day. We do understand that sometimes there is an emergency and children need to arrive late or be picked up early, but this should not be regular. Parents will receive a letter of concern if truancy or lateness is an ongoing issue.

Farewell to our School Caretaker

Spud has decided to return to live where the weather is warmer. A special thanks to him for his time with us. Spud had a great relationship with our tamariki and had them involved in several building projects (authentic learning opportunities). Spud's carpentry skills were also a great asset to have in the school. All the best from us all.
