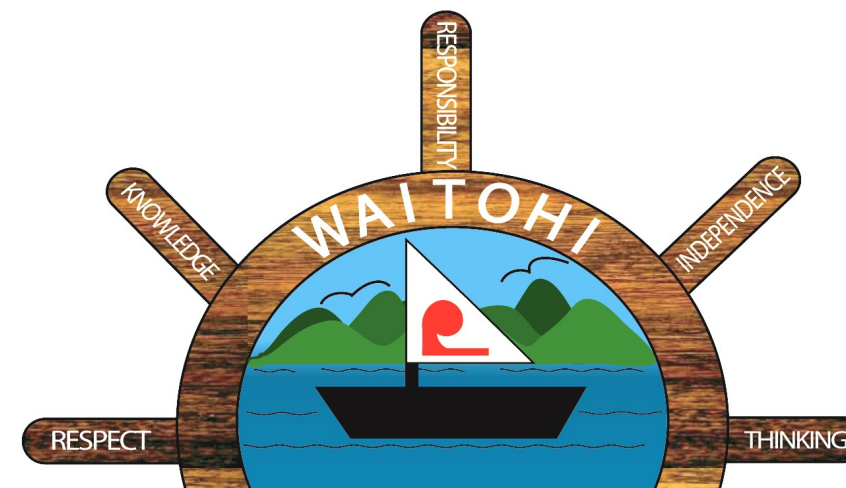

Principal's Message

The dangers of 'being clever'

So just what's wrong with being clever, and being told that you're clever?

Nothing's wrong with being clever. Becoming clever is the very point of education after all - at least in the sense of becoming a skilled, knowledgeable and effective learner. But reassuring children that they are clever - whether they are or not - serves to (mis)direct children away from the task at hand (immersion in the process of learning) and towards an obsession with their success or failure (and flawed explanations for the performance product). So, praising them for their intelligence, inadvertently leads to the sort of brittle, intellectual self-confidence that shatters in the face of 'failure'.

If my smartness explains my successes, then my lack of smartness must explain my failures. So how can I best protect my self-image from threat? By choosing tasks and activities that doom me to easy success, and by avoiding tough challenges at all costs.

Fixed mindsets can be safe and comfortable, but they lead nowhere.
