Value Cards

Another 90 Values Cards were earned last week taking the total for the term to 180. There was a House Challenge on Friday involving memory into which, each House entered a Senior and Junior team. Congratulations to Kaipupu House who won with a score of 67 out of a possible 80, closely followed by Arapaoa on 66, then Totaranui on 58 and Waitohi on 41.

Totaranui are having a great term, easily the top earners so far this term. However, Waitohi retain their place on top in the competition for the House Shield with 2,410 points, a lead of just under 300. That sounds a lot but with heaps more values cards available plus some more House Challenges to come they haven't won it yet!

Kāhui Ako (Community of Learning) news

Our role is a very privileged one. Between us, we get to visit schools and early childhood centres and talk to children and adults. We get to hear local Principals and Head Teachers speak of their vision for achievement in their schools. We listen in on some high powered conversations about the direction of education in New Zealand. We get to think about what we are doing well and what we can improve on. Here are some of the things we are celebrating in our area:

- All our Community of Learning schools have agreed to use PaCT (the Progress and Consistency Tool) to make judgements about children's progress. Parents and teachers will be able to view progress in the same format as children progress from one school to
- Early Childhood Centres are taking an active interest in things like PaCT and other measures of learning and progress and thinking how they can prepare children to be ready for their next stage.
- The Kāhui Ako team is working on graduate profiles: what are the key things we want children to do as they move from one stage to the next. This gives a goal for teaching and learning to focus on. There are already big gains in the transitioning of children as they start school.
- Our Marlborough RTLB team (looking after children with learning and behavioural needs) is working on gathering data about children with special educational needs, so that they can better support these children and their teachers, especially across transitions. They will also handle the privacy issues that have meant that some necessary data hasn't been passed on, making it hard for these children to settle and get the best out of their education.
