Dear School Friends and Families



One of our Strategic Goals is to do with increasing student engagement in learning. At our board meeting this week, we looked at information which staff had gathered about how well children were

engaged in their learning across the various learning areas in terms of % time on task. We found that most of our children were on task for at least 50% of their learning time, including many above 80%. The challenge for us is to plan and implement strategies to foster increased learning focus for those students who aren't so engaged. We'll monitor this throughout the year, and hopefully we will see some positive 'shifts' in the data.

Speaking of the Charter, it is currently with the Ministry of Education for approval, and once we have received their feedback, we will pop it onto our Facebook page as well as having hard copies at school for those who would like one to read. Our Charter review process has resulted in a more readable, concise document this year.

Board of Trustees (BOT) Update:

The five BOT members of Lumsden School Michelle Mitchell, Simon Saunders, Ang Sheat, Carrie Adams and Amanda Russell meet monthly with Principal Andrew Watson and Staff Representative Chloe Madden to ensure the smooth governance of the school. Issues that the BOT have recently been discussing include:

- The Bike Park project; funding and safety plan.
- Employing a caretaker to ensure the school grounds are well maintained and pressure is taken off parents and FOLS.
- Property developments such us the new boiler and renovation of the schools hallway space to provide an art bay and break out learning spaces.
- Tracking of student progress across all curriculum areas.
- Developing a new system for ongoing review of school policies and procedures following the withdrawal from School Docs.
- The development of a new Charter for the school based on the Community Consultation carried out in 2018. A summary of key themes from parent's responses to this consultation can be found attached to this newsletter and look out for the new Charter and Annual Plan which will show how the school will address the issues raised.
- The government's Tomorrows Schools Review.

Next term the election of BOT members will be held in June and we will be looking for nominations to replace a few outgoing members. Being a BOT member is an exciting way to shape the future direction of Lumsden School and it is important that the BOT represents all members of our school community. If I was the Easter Bunny I would eat all the eggs. But I will save eggs. I will eat one more egg. – By Duncan


If I was the Easter Bunny I would hand out the eggs to my friends. I will hide them. - By Elijah



Lumsden School 2018 Parent Survey

Key Themes of the 25 responses received:

Bi-culturalism:

When asked what the school did well the most common answer was Kapa Haka and Polyfest which parents said was very enjoyable this year. Good cultural programs at the school were also listed as important and some parents want more Māori language to be taught and better pronunciation of Te Reo with suggestions to make Kapa Haka and marae visits bi-annual, more speakers visiting the school to korero and more appropriate songs at assembly.

Community:

Likewise the involvement of the community and families at school events and programs as well as good support for individual children and families was seen as a strength of the school by most parents and something that it was important to continue to encourage. The clubs program and lunchtime activities was praised by many parents, as was the Bike park, speeches and variety of local speakers talking at the school. Generally the school was seen as welcoming towards new families and students and parents appreciated the way that activities involving the whole school and small mixed age classes fostered tuakana-teina (older-younger) relationships between children.

When asked what opportunities the school could take better advantage of, involving the retired community, multi-cultural communities and local businesses were suggested.

Communication:

Many parents believe there is good communication between the school and home and like the weekly newsletter, use of School Stream and relevant Facebook presence. Some parents however believe that there could be better communication, especially around behavioural issues and want consistent emails and communication from duty and relief teachers to know about events that impact on the emotional well being of their children. Some parents also wanted a more current and relevant website for the school and consistent protocols for reports across all year levels.

Behaviour:

Many parents support the positive encouragement of behavior at Lumsden School. They like the inclusive, values focused approach and natural consequences for inappropriate behavior, saying that bullying has reduced, behavior is generally good and that the school environment is safe. Some parents however feel that there are inconsistent playground expectations among teachers and want stricter discipline for 'repeat offenders'/bullies and a stronger stance on bad behavior. Continuing to focus on positive school values, life skills and behavior is important to most families of the school with one suggesting mindfulness as a possible approach.

Teachers / Classes:

Parents were very happy with the small class sizes and student teacher ratios at Lumsden School and felt that there had been good consultation with parents around class placement. Generally, parents found the teachers to be welcoming, confident and professional and the Principal to be approachable and a great leader. Parents placed great importance of having a welcoming environment to both students and parents coming into the school and in to classrooms. There was also the suggestion of a parent help roster.

Some parents also placed importance on continuity of teachers with less reliance on relief teachers. They felt that this could compromise benefits to children from the schools CoL involvement, for example.

However networking and information sharing with other schools was seen as important and many parents wanted to ensure the highest quality teachers were retained and motivated through support from the parents and BOT.

Curriculum:

Most parents appreciate the out of classroom opportunities and variety of fun, holistic, project based activities at Lumsden school, with most parents feeling that it is important to encourage more of these activities to create a positive learning environment and important life skills. The importance of play based learning in the Junior school was also mentioned by many parents who suggested including more art, music, construction and messy play in the NE/junior classes.

Of most importance to many parents however was 'focusing on the basics' of meeting reading, writing and maths milestones to ensure students are well prepared to enter college - by finding the perfect balance between developing the person and these skills. Parents were divided about the role of technology in supporting this goal with some parents calling for more digital technology in the classroom and praising programs such as coding, EPro8 and Lit Quiz and others calling for less technology and more (hand) writing.

PE was another area many parents wanted to see developed, with more focus on enjoyment and less reliance on parent input. The school camp and ski/winter trips were praised and the idea of extending them suggested.

More agriculture in the curriculum was also a major theme through the survey with suggestions of the schools participation in Agrikids and Enviroschools.

When asked what opportunities Lumsden could take advantage of, better links and cooperation with the local ECE centres (Playcentre and Riverstones) and NS College were suggested as was links to the local rural farming community and environment (eg, national parks, fishing, ski fields).

Physical environment:

The Cycle track was certainly the highlight with many parents praising its improvement to the physical environment, support from the local community and promotion of physical activity. Many parents also commented that the school grounds were looking a bit messy and could be better kept. Suggestions were made around the school joining Enviroschools or an agricultural club set up to encourage more gardening and care for the school environment by students.

Library: The library was also seen as a resource that could be better used by many parents with suggestions that it open at lunchtimes and allow borrowing twice a week.

Outside issues:

Included: busy parents, financial strains on parents (one parent suggested that parents transport to events and school camp should be funded), isolation (and home school divide for bus families), the weather, and most mentioned was the transient nature of the community and many students.

What most parents would like to see in 10 years:

"Happy" children, teachers, parents, families and community was mentioned by most parents. As was modern facilities, holistic learning, high achievement and a school that is a leader.
