First Reading Acts 13:14,43-52 Gospel

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to synagogue on the Sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain I give them eternal life; faithful to the grace God had given them.

The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled they will never be lost to hear the word of God. The inter-school Cross Country (for years 3 - 8) will be held at Rangitoto on the 22nd May.


In the case of wet weather a decision will be made about postponing the event and you will be contacted by 8.30am. We look forward to seeing you there.

FROM FATHER MATT...

Holy Orders

This Sunday is Good Shepherd Sunday and on this day we have a special focus on priesthood. Given this it seems like a good time to reflect on the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Certainly Holy Orders is the Sacrament that we see the least of. But it is vital to the life of the Church and the spiritual wellbeing of her people. Jesus made it this way. He instituted the Sacrament of Holy Orders on the night that he was betrayed and since that time the Apostles and their successors, the Bishops have ordained co-workers. These co-workers are called Priests (in the New Testament, Presbyters).



This is something of what the Catechism teaches about the Sacrament of Holy Orders regarding the Priesthood: **1536** Holy Orders is the sacrament through which the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time: thus it is the sacrament of apostolic ministry. It includes three degrees: episcopate, presbyterate, and diaconate.

1552 The ministerial priesthood has the task not only of representing Christ - Head of the Church - before the assembly of the faithful, but also of acting in the name of the whole Church when presenting to God the prayer of the Church, and above all when offering the Eucharistic sacrifice.

1565 Through the sacrament of Holy Orders priests share in the universal dimensions of the mission that Christ entrusted to the apostles. The spiritual gift they have received in ordination prepares them, not for a limited and restricted mission, "but for the fullest, in fact the universal mission of salvation 'to the end of the earth, prepared in spirit to preach the Gospel everywhere."

1581 This sacrament configures the recipient to Christ by a special grace of the Holy Spirit, so that he may serve as Christ's instrument for his Church. By ordination one is enabled to act as a representative of Christ, Head of the Church, in his triple office of priest, prophet, and king.

1582 As in the case of Baptism and Confirmation this share in Christ's office is granted once for all. The sacrament of Holy Orders, like the other two, confers an indelible spiritual character and cannot be repeated or conferred temporarily.
