READINGS FOR SUNDAY, 2 JUNE 2019

First Reading Acts 1:1-11

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a spirit of wisdom and perception of what is revealed, to bring you to full knowledge of him. May he enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named not only in this age but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

Jesus said to his disciples:

'You see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this.

'And now I am sending down to you what the Father has promised. Stay in the city then, until you are clothed with the power from on high."

Then he took them out as far as the outskirts of Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. Now as he blessed them, he withdrew from them and was carried up to heaven. They worshipped him and then went back to Jerusalem full of joy; and they were continually in the Temple praising God.


Catholic Schools Day

FROM FATHER MATT ...

Perhaps the most important homily ever delivered was by Jesus 2,000 years ago in what we now call the Sermon on the Mount. It occupies chapters 4,5 and 6 of the Gospel of Matthew. It was delivered in Galilee (presumably from an elevated piece of land) and is generally considered to contain the central tenets of Christian discipleship. Perhaps it is most known for Jesus' articulation of what we now call 'The Beatitudes'. These are 8 key teachings. Below is an edited article from Mons. Charles Pope who explains what they mean and why they are so important. The remaining Beatitudes will follow.

Blessings Fr. Matt

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

The poor in spirit depend on God humbly and serenely. They are poor to this world because their treasure is in Heaven. As the Lord says, "Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be" (Matthew 6:21). With their treasure in Heaven and their hearts focused there, the poor in spirit are not obsessed with this world's trinkets. Their desires are properly aligned with what matters, with what lasts: God Himself and the eternal joys of Heaven. There is a great blessedness and simplicity to be found when one is freed of obsessions with wealth, popularity, and conformity to this world's constantly changing and distracting demands.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Those who mourn are those who are sorry for sin. They see the state of God's people. They see that many are lost, basing their lives on what can neither save nor satisfy, living lives that are misdirected and futile. The

mournful weep for God's people, but it is not a depressed mourning, rather, it is a motivational one. By it, they pray and work for the salvation of souls. Their mourning places an urgency in their hearts to reach the lost, fallen, and confused. The text speaks of them as being comforted, but both the Greek and Latin roots of the word "comfort" have more to do with being strengthened and assisted than with being consoled and relieved of burdens. The mournful are given the strength and courage they need in order to address what makes them mourn and be strengthened unto the salvation of souls.



Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

The meek are those who have authority over their anger. Their anger is directed properly, towards things such as injustice and ignorance of God's ways. They are increasingly freed from anger over insignificant, egocentric, and fear-based things. Their proper anger is like a creative energy directed toward working for justice and the proclamation of God's truth. They inherit the land because those who work for truth secure a better future for the land and people they love. Of the meek, Scripture says, And your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to dwell in (Is 58:12).

The Bible says it this way:


A cloud took him out of their sight. We Christians say: he ascended into heaven.

Thank you for your letter of 31 January, received in my office on 15 February 2019, inviting me to provide a statement of support for the Catholic Schools Day you are planning for 28 May 2019.

Following is a message you may include in the publicity release for media, your staff, students, and their parents, caregivers, families and whanau:

Catholic schools, along with all state-integrated schools, are an important part of the New Zealand education system. There are 239 Catholic schools in New Zealand, catering for 67,000 students. These students represent 8% of enrolments across all schools. Many students in New Zealand enjoy learning at a Catholic school, and parents choose these schools because they know the school will provide a quality education that reflects their values and beliefs.

The students who attend Catholic schools are often highly successful in their academic achievements. They are also successful in many other domains. This reflects the time, effort and dedication of Catholic school leaders, teachers, non-teaching staff, parents, caregivers, families and whanau, and the students themselves.

The Crown has recognised the important partnership it has had with Catholic schools since the 1970s, when Catholic schools were integrated into the state education system. State-integrated education provides an opportunity for students to be taught the full New Zealand Curriculum alongside education of a special character.

It is the traditions of Catholic education that make Catholic schools unique. In an increasingly diverse and evolving New Zealand, the challenge for all Catholic schools is how they interpret these traditions for 21st Century students. I encourage all those involved in Catholic schools to rise to this challenge and consider what aspects can be strengthened or changed while continuing to emphasise Catholic education.
