MRS DOWNEY'S NOTES ...

Hoki mai ki te kura o Katorika o Hato Hohepa

The church following Jesus' Ascension on Ascension Sunday, has celebrated Pentecost. This week it is Trinity Sunday (where we acknowledge the three persons - God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. On the 23rd of June it is the feast of Corpus Christi (the Holy Body and Blood of Christ is a focus). The 23rd of June is also our **TERM 2 WHOLE SCHOOL MASS.** If you have not been to Mass this term with your family, we welcome your attendance on this day.

Health and Wellbeing

I acknowledge the difficulty for families who have had unwell children this past two weeks.

It is a challenge to care for our loved ones, nurse them back to health and balance the other aspects of our lives.

At school, we are very grateful to our relievers who have come to teach for our teachers who are sick or have sick children. They also take the classes while teachers take their two days a term, Curriculum Release Days, which are mostly used at this time of the year to analyse data and write reports.

Of our 119 students during the past two weeks we have had

16 who have had full attendance

65 who have been absent for less than 4 days and

33 who have been absent for 4-8 days

The area is experiencing a lot of sickness and the recommendation to families and schools is to do as much as we can to instill healthy practices around coughing, sneezing and handwashing. We have increased the use of hand sanitisers before eating and before using computers. Antibacterial wipes are used to wipe down the computers at the end of each day. Liz Brandon (Public Health Educator) has been into the school to go over healthy habits around sneezing, coughing and washing.

Please could you support these initiatives at home. A recent local survey saw sinks and computers growing more bacteria than toilets! The other reminder is to please **check your children for headlice** every 2 or 3 days. It seems they are enjoying the warm moist climate as well as the bacteria are!

Matariki and Kapa Haka

Our team of students are practicing hard for this event on Thursday 27th June at the Les Munro centre. Thank you Amai for your tutelage and the teachers for supporting this group of students. It is hard work learning the waiata and haka. Amai has composed some special items just for our kura which is very special.

Orienteering and Rippa Rugby

Thank you to Kerryn Herbert for taking the Rippa Rugby team last Friday. They performed extremely well and will travel to Taupo on Wednesday for the next round. Tomorrow our Orienteering team head to Aria. The team always enjoy the hospitality Aria offer along with the opportunity to run out in the open country. All the best to all our students competing in these events

Tatsuno Contingent

Five of our students, with their families support are in Tatsuno presently. These students have presented themselves for interviews with the Waitomo District Council and then gone on to prepare themselves for this cultural experience. They will have a fantastic time and it will bond them with fellow school students from Te Kuiti as well. We wait to hear their stories!

FROM FATHER MATT ...

Continued from last week we look at the Beatitudes (meaning Blessing). Although often misunderstood, they provide key frameworks for living the Christian life and are from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. Below is the conclusion of an edited article from Mons. Charles Pope who explains what they mean and why they are so important.

Blessings

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

The peacemakers are not merely those who keep us from killing one another. The word "shalom" (peace) as well as the Greek word *eirene* have the notion of holiness, of having in our life and relationship everything that should be there. The peacemakers are those who work to ensure that the things that make for holiness and integrity are available to others. They work for and teach truth, respect, reciprocity, reverence, and virtue. In this they set forth the ingredients for peace. They are the children of God because this is the very thing that God does and children resemble their parents.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven. Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in Heaven. Thus they persecuted the prophets who were before you. The persecuted are blessed and happy because they know that they suffer for the right things and are in good company. They also know that they are suffering for being the right thing, the contrasting thing in

a world hostile and opposed to God. They are light in darkness, free men among those in bondage. Although they are persecuted, it matters less to them because their hearts are with God and set on the things of Heaven. Even death has no sting because death is the very thing that births them to the eternal glory for which they long. They know that their reward is great, far eclipsing any suffering they endure. They are blessed, happy, and free.

Conclusion:

Such a gift it is that is being described here: the life of the transformed human person! Note how each of the beatitudes amounts to a matter of the heart: a heart that is pure, a heart that is set on one thing rather than torn by anger or other disordered passions, a heart that hungers and thirsts for righteousness and is increasingly free from the world (except to rescue others who are trapped in its false claims and futility). Having their treasure in Heaven, the blessed are poor to this world because they have little need to hoard its trinkets. They are rich, however, for theirs is the Kingdom of God and God Himself.

HEAD LICE



HEAD LICE ALERT

PLEASE CHECK YOUR CHILD'S HAIR TONIGHT!!

TO CHECK

Check the scalp for insects or eggs.

Use a fine-tooth comb on wet hair then comb through the hair in sections looking for eggs or lice, repeat over a few days.

TO TREAT

Wet the hair and scalp with conditioner or use chemical shampoo/ lotion (containing insecticide) – this will kill the lice and eggs. Using a fine metal comb, or special head lice comb you can get from a chemist, go through the hair in sections to comb the lice and eggs out.

Always re-treat 7–10 days after the first treatment, to kill any head lice that may have hatched from eggs that survived the first treatment.

TIPS

- ✓ Check and treat the hair every night
- ✓ Please tie up long hair for school
- ✓ If your child has head lice please check everyone in the family home
 - ✓ Do not share hairbrushes, towels, hats/ scarves etc.
