Dear Parents and whānau

This term, students in the junior and middle schools are taking part in the personal safety programme *Keeping Ourselves Safe*.

Keeping Ourselves Safe has been designed to give students the skills to cope in situations involving abuse. It has three overall aims:

- to develop and strengthen children's skills to keep themselves safe with other people;
- to support and encourage abused children to get help from caring adults;
- to make teachers and parents/caregivers more aware of the need to keep children safe from abuse by adults or other children.

Keeping Ourselves Safe will be taught by your child's teacher, with support from the local Police School Community Officer Maxine Walshe.

To be successful, *Keeping Ourselves Safe* needs your help and support. Your child may have homework activities to work on with you.

It is important that you participate as much as possible and talk to your child about what they have been learning. This will help reinforce the messages the school is giving, and help your child to use his or her new skills with confidence.

Keeping safe in cyberspace

The significant changes to technology and the way it is used present new challenges for schools in creating an environment where teachers and students are confident in the safe and secure use of ICT.

The issue of cyber safety has expanded beyond policies and procedures to include discussion, action, and teachable moments in the classroom. Students need to build the skills and knowledge to effectively manage cyber challenges and become confident and successful digital citizens.

Online hazards include:

exposure to inappropriate or illegal material

disclosure of personal information that may place students or their families at risk of fraud, burglary or other crimes

younger children may copy older siblings who are involved in inappropriate activities

cyberbullying and harassment

contact from people who mean to harm children and young people.

FAQ - Frequently asked questions about KOS

From parents

How often will my child get KOS?

Schools are encouraged to implement KOS each year for the first three years of schooling and then it is usually taught in a two-year cycle for both years 4–6 and 7–8.

Why does my child need KOS?

Any child can be abused. While the family home may be a safe place, the child will have contact with many people and enter a number of other homes. You can't keep them safe all the time. If it doesn't happen to your child, and we hope it doesn't, it may happen to their friend. Your child may be in a position to help.

Doesn't KOS destroy a child's innocence?

Abuse certainly does. KOS teaches children safety skills in a safe, positive classroom environment.

Isn't this just an anti-male programme?

It is accepted that both males and females can be abusers and stories and scenarios demonstrate this. Both males and females are also presented in positive, caring roles.

Does this mean my male partner can't bath my child?

Positive family interactions, such as those involved with caring for a child, are very important for a child's well-being. So are hugs and cuddles.

What should I do if I suspect abuse?

Show love, concern and support and reassure the child that it is not their fault. Don't interrogate them. Report the abuse in the way outlines in your school policy. This will be either to Police or Child, Youth and Family. You will find their telephone numbers in your telephone book.

What happens when abuse is reported to Oranga Tamariki or Police?

A team is set up to handle the report. There will be a child protection worker from Child, Youth and Family who has the job of ensuring the young person is safe. There will be a member of the Police Child Abuse Team who will investigate whether an offence has been committed and will find out who is responsible.

I teach my child about stranger danger. Isn't that enough?

Most children are abused by someone that they know. If you teach them that abuse only happens from people they don't know, they will not recognise it when it is done by a known and often trusted person.

What sort of abuse are we talking about?

There are five types of child maltreatment – physical, emotional, sexual, neglect and family violence. All forms are damaging for the child.

Can I withdraw my child from KOS?

Your child can be withdrawn if the school agrees to this. Remember, though, that any child can be abused and your child does need some education on how to avoid abuse.

Should I prevent my child from going on the Internet?

There are unsafe situations that can arise online. However, the Internet is also a valuable information tool. To help your child keep safe, make sure the computer is in a family space, and make sure your child knows never to give out their name and address online, or to agree to meet someone they have met online.
