If you have volunteered to help transport children, can you please be at school 25 minutes prior to our lesson, so we can arrive and have our shoes on and be ready to start on time. Thank you again for your support with travel and paying for lessons.

Ski Trip

This is on Tuesday 27th August. Prior to going we have two important aspects that we go through to ensure the day runs smoothly.

The first is the **ski gear check on Monday 19th August**. Your child brings each item on the ski gear checklist to school in a bag to show their teacher. We check this off on a list so that we know that the children are appropriately dressed for the day and will cope with the cold. Please make sure your child has everything they need at school on this day. They then take the gear home again, ready to wear for ski day.

If you need any items on the list, please do ask about these, as people will have spare clothing. Here at school we do have some spare jackets and pants which we are very happy to lend to people. Just come and ask and we will help you.

The second aspect is a parent meeting that I run in the senior room straight after school on Monday 19th. At this I outline how the day runs (this is very important as we don't want people to delay us getting the children to lessons on time or to have people unsure of the school's expectations). I also cover safety aspects (helmets and fluoro vests are compulsory on the ski day for all adults and children), show you footage of the mountain and generally get people set up so they know what they need to do. Any first time ski participants with our school attend this meeting and anyone else who would like to come along to check they are up to date with what is happening.

Safety on a school ski trip is very important. Fiona Weir and I have spent a significant amount of time getting the paperwork in place but it will only be successful if everyone is on the same page and understands that the children are the key focus of the day.

Below is a list of gear that is required:

- Long sleeved thermal/wool top
- Thermal bottom layer long johns or thermal leggings
- ❖ Another warm top layer sweatshirt, jersey, fleece
- Waterproof and windproof jacket
- Ski pants
- Ski goggles or sunglasses
- Warm hat that covers the ears
- Warm waterproof gloves
