Our girls team of Lucy Neilson, Zoe Harman, Anna Stuart, Reef Becker and Olivia Russell gained Gold edging out Otago Girls' by a narrow margin.

The mixed team of Fletcher Dowling, Ryan Shead, Zac Mackenzie, Harmony Devitt and Ashleigh Paul gained the Silver in their competition losing only to Bayfield who won the competition. These students had never curled together before and some had only been playing for two weeks!

Our senior boys team of William Becker, Sam Flanagan, Ben Voice and Damian Carson received the Bronze in the hotly contested boys competition. Early losses saw them slip through contention for gold, but some close games were played.

We also had four Year 8 boys play; Jack Steele, Robert Hall, Case MacDonald and William Hutton - Atkins who, although did not place, played some excellent games and gained some great experience.

Lucy Neilson and Zoe Harman have been named in the NZ U21 Women's Curling team to travel to Finland in December. Well done girls! HORTICULTURE FIELD TRIP

Recently the level 2 and 3 NCEA Horticulture class partook on a field trip of the irrigation methods used around the Maniototo. We visited Mark Paterson and his sheep and beer farm. He showed us four irrigation methods on his property, which included Pivot, Boarder dyke, K-line and Flood irrigation. It was really valuable to have someone with a vast knowledge on this area explain how and why these systems are used, which gave much more depth of information to the students written reports for their internal assessment.

GIFTED & TALENTED PROGRAMME

The trips I went on to the Portobello Marine Centre for Gifted and Talented Students were amazing. I learned a lot about the creatures living in the Mudflats, which was what my group, Mawhero, had been chosen to study. We studied the Mudflat Biodiversity and how freshwater impact affected it with our mentor, Jean. It was a great experience for me and I really enjoyed it.

Our trip was divided into three parts, all of which included an overnight stay on Quarantine Island. There we were allowed to explore the island and after a shared dinner we would be split into groups to do challenges. These included, creating an animal, creating a god, doing a quiz and other mind-challenging games. Our favourite one overall was the Sea Animal Olympics.

Some of the Highlights for me included finding the creatures living in the Mudflats and trying to rescue the oranges we used to measure freshwater flow. Staying on Quarantine Island during the trips and taking the bush-walk with some of the others and visiting the graveyard. Watching the novel presentations of the other groups. Doing our novel presentation and meeting and hanging out with all the other students.

It was certainly an adventure I won't soon forget. I suggest to anyone who is given the opportunity to go there takes it. Because they will enjoy it and it can be a great experience. *Charlotte Gregan (Year 10)*


