ENVIROSCHOOLS EVENT



This week 330 wetland plants were tucked into new homes at the Romesdale Lagoon in the Bowlers Wharf Reserve, Papakowhai. This was possible due to the hard work of two local Enviroschools - Papakowhai and Paremata, who were keen to get out and help diversify native plants in this area under the guidance of Porirua City Council, Enviroschools Te Upoko o Te Ika a Māui & Conservation Volunteers Wellington.

This estuarine saltmarsh wetland is a significant natural wetland in the region and is receiving support from our Greater Wellington Wetland Programme for ecological weed control. Less than 3% of all wetlands remain in our region – so working together to help and restore those that remain is a must.

REGIONAL PUBLIC HEALTH INFORMATION WITH REGARDS TO MEASLES

We have been contacted by the Public Health Department and asked to share the following information with the school community.

Measles – important information from Regional Public Health (RPH)

As you know, there is a large and increasing measles outbreak in Auckland with over 800 confirmed cases and over 900 cases nationally. There have been 21 cases in the Wellington region this year.

Measles is likely to continue in NZ for months with travel, school holidays, interschool events and tournaments increasing the likelihood of further measles spread.

Safeguarding your children from measles by being fully vaccinated, keeping students and staff off school and excluding those who have been exposed but are not immune will all help protect others, especially those at risk of complications from disease. It will also help to ensure they don't miss learning opportunities, NECA school exams, arts and sports tournaments and school balls.

To protect your child and their school RPH recommends the following actions NOW

- Check the table below to see if you and your whanau are protected from measles
- If you are travelling to Auckland, especially South
 Auckland make sure you are vaccinated. This advice
 NOW includes babies aged 12-15 months who are
 recommended to have their first measles vaccine early
 before going to Auckland.

- If you are not vaccinated, we advise you to check your medical centre's website or phone to see when they will be able to vaccinate you. The current measles outbreak in Auckland has led to an increased demand for the MMR vaccine.
- Talk to your doctor if you are travelling overseas;
 especially if you have babies aged 6-12 months.
- Provide a copy of your child's immunisation records to your school when asked. This information can be found:
 - a. Wellchild book
 - Asking your medical centre for a printout of your/ your child's immunisations
 - c. For children aged 0 to 14 years the parent can email RES-NIR@huttvalleydhb.org.nz and ask for a copy of your child's National Immunisation Register record. We will need the child's NHI number (if known), full name, date of birth, including mum's first and last name. This will ensure we get the correct record if there are children with similar names born on the same day.
- If your children are NOT protected from measles start
 thinking about alternative arrangements if there is
 confirmed measles at your school. Children who are not
 protected CANNOT attend school, sports or social events
 for up to 14 days after their last contact with the
 infectious person. This date will be extended if there are
 further cases in the school.

Measles will be very disruptive to the school community and we want parents/caregivers and students to be prepared and protected – either by having your immunisation records ready or immunising now if you are not protected. You can contact Regional Public Health for further advice if required on 04 570 9002.

Thank you for your help in reducing the impact of measles in your community.



Giving quality feedback

- Teachers are regularly appraised and receive quality feedback and next steps
- Teachers give regular feedback and articulate clear success criteria.
- Teachers clearly report on what children have learnt and what they need to learn next.

Providing quality teaching

- Teachers have access to quality professional learning
- Children and teachers have access to quality resources, including quality digital resources
- Literacy and numeracy is taught consistently in differentiated groups with a clear learning focus
- Teachers use the "Teaching as Inquiry" model.

Setting aspirational targets

 School-wide achievement targets and plans promote high expectations for all students, including Māori and Pasifika and students with special needs.

Strategies include:

Offering a wide range of learning opportunities

 Children have opportunities to enjoy and learn in The Arts, Science, Social Sciences, Physical Education, Languages, Social Sciences and Technology • Children have opportunities to learn outside the classroom.

- Teachers plan enjoyable moments that meet the learning, social and emotional needs of children.

- Recruit and retain highly skilled staff through clear selection criteria, effective induction and support.
- Develop an annual budget that is focussed on strategic outcomes and use robust financial management systems
- Ensure our infrastructure and physical environment meets the needs of a growing and modern school

Reviewing regularly

- Develop and implement effective policies that promote current ideas for teaching, learning and assessment
- Develop and implement a regular cycle of planning and review that promotes best practice

Innovating digitally

 Encourage teachers to develop action learning into digital, creative and/or innovative learning

OUR VALUES

The curriculum encourages all students to reflect on their own learning processes and to learn how to learn.

Community engagement

The curriculum has meaning for students, connects with their wider lives, and engages the support of their families, whānau, and communities.

Coherence

The curriculum offers all students a broad education that makes links within and across learning areas, provides for coherent transitions, and opens up pathways to further learning.

Future focus

The curriculum encourages students to look to the future by exploring such significant future-focused issues as sustainability, citizenship, enterprise, and globalisation.
