GASTRO BUGS AT SCHOOL

We have had several children throughout the school affected by severe vomiting and diarrhoea over the last few weeks. Please remind children to wash their hands before eating and thoroughly after using the toilet. If your child is affected by a tummy bug please keep them at home for 48 hours after the last episode of vomiting or diarrhoea to reduce the risk of spreading the bug at school.

SOCIAL SKILLS

Our current social skill is **Responsibility**. Responsibility is about taking ownership of our thoughts, words and actions. It begins with those little things such as taking care of our belongings, working



with a good attitude, resolving conflicts peacefully and owning up to our mistakes.

None of us are born acting responsibly. It is something that develops over time. We want our children to behave responsibly in their everyday lives.

How can you help at home?

- Have a discussion about responsibility in your family. What responsibilities does your child have? How does taking responsibility make your home a happier place?
- Catch your child being responsible.
 Make sure your child knows that they
 have done something good. Expressing
 your approval is a powerful way to
 reinforce good behaviour.
- Get your children to help with chores at home. Handing out responsibilities needs to start early.
- Remember that your child is always watching you.
 Be sure to model responsible behaviour.
- Teach your child about consequences. It's important that we enforce rules through having expectations like packing an activity away. Children need to learn that making bad choices has consequences.



OUR STRATEGIES

1. Achieving high expectations for all students

Strategies include:

Giving quality feedback

- Teachers are regularly appraised and receive quality feedback and next steps
- Teachers give regular feedback and articulate clear success criteria.
- Teachers clearly report on what children have learnt and what they need to learn next.

Providing quality teaching

- Teachers have access to quality professional learning
- Children and teachers have access to quality resources, including quality digital resources
- Literacy and numeracy is taught consistently in differentiated groups with a clear learning focus
- Teachers use the "Teaching as Inquiry" model.

Setting aspirational targets

 School-wide achievement targets and plans promote high expectations for all students, including Māori and Pasifika and students with special needs.

2. Ensuring every child enjoys success.

Strategies include:

Offering a wide range of learning opportunities

 Children have opportunities to enjoy and learn in The Arts, Science, Social Sciences, Physical Education, Languages, Social Sciences and Technology • Children have opportunities to learn outside the classroom.

• Increasing student engagement

- Teachers plan enjoyable moments that meet the learning, social and emotional needs of children.
- Children have some choice about what they are learning and how they will learn it.
- Teachers know the children and make every effort to connect with them.

- Children with special needs are identified and plans are put in place to meet their learning, social and emotional and physical needs.
- Children with special abilities are identified and plans are put in place to meet their learning, social and emotional and physical needs.

Respecting Māori

- Make Te Reo Māori a regular part of classroom programmes
- Use Māori protocol when and where appropriate

- Recruit and retain highly skilled staff through clear selection criteria, effective induction and support.
- Develop an annual budget that is focussed on strategic outcomes and use robust financial management systems
- Ensure our infrastructure and physical environment meets the needs of a growing and modern school

Reviewing regularly

- Develop and implement effective policies that promote current ideas for teaching, learning and assessment
- Develop and implement a regular cycle of planning and review that promotes best practice

Innovating digitally

 Encourage teachers to develop action learning into digital, creative and/or innovative learning

OUR VALUES

OUR PRINCIPLES

High expectations

The curriculum supports and empowers all students to learn and achieve personal excellence, regardless of their individual circumstances.

Treaty of Waitangi

The curriculum acknowledges the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi, and the bicultural foundations of Aotearoa New Zealand. All students have the opportunity to acquire knowledge of te reo Māori me ōna tikanga.

Cultural diversity

The curriculum reflects New Zealand's cultural diversity and values the histories and traditions of all its people.

Inclusion

The curriculum is non-sexist, non-racist, and non-discriminatory; it ensures that students' identities, languages, abilities, and talents are recognised and affirmed and that their learning needs are addressed.

Learning to learn

The curriculum encourages all students to reflect on their own learning processes and to learn how to learn.

Community engagement

The curriculum has meaning for students, connects with their wider lives, and engages the support of their families, whānau, and communities.

Coherence

The curriculum offers all students a broad education that makes links within and across learning areas, provides for coherent transitions, and opens up pathways to further learning.

Future focus

The curriculum encourages students to look to the future by exploring such significant future-focused issues as sustainability, citizenship, enterprise, and globalisation.
