A particularly positive ongoing initiative is the work on developing strong relationships with our local Shannon Kindergarten, Playcentre and Kohanga Reo in order to enable smooth transitions from early childhood into school. It's great to hear what is happening in this space with the building of connections and fostering familiarity with both staff and children and the way that Shannon students are getting behind this.

Two areas that we are wanting to focus on in term 4 are (1) the profile of our school and (2) the preparations of senior students for the transition to college. We'll be looking at our profile/reputation initially in a process involving the board and staff, but will also be keen to hear thoughts on this from any of our community members – Shannon school needs to be positively owned and respected and at the heart of our Shannon community and we'd love to know if you have any particular ideas around how we can continue to work at this. In terms of the transition to college, many of you were involved in the community consult that was held at the end of 2018 and we are looking at doing a similar process on (Monday, 18 November) – including getting input from ex-pupils and parents about their experience of transitioning to college – what has worked and what hasn't and what we can be working on. So, please put this in your calendars.

Finally, we want to acknowledge the deep sense of loss for those of our community who are grieving the passing of whanau members and our thoughts are also with those whose loved ones are unwell. Our care for each other and walking alongside one another through these hard times is so important and helps remind us of what really matters as we juggle all the busy-ness of life.


