The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, concerning Judah and Jerusalem.


The word of the Lord

Catholics mark our waiting with an Advent wreath that has four candles. One candle is lit each Sunday. Why not make one for your family, and light it each evening?

FROM FATHER MATT ...

This Sunday we begin the liturgical season of Advent. With this in mind here is a very good (edited) article from lay theologian, Jimmy Akin about key aspects of Advent. Blessings Fr. Matt

What Is the Purpose of Advent?

Advent has a twofold character:

as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming at the end of time.

Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation [Norms 39]. Properly speaking, Advent is a season that brings to mind the Two Comings of Christ.

What Liturgical Colors Are Used in Advent?

The normal color for Advent is violet.

The color rose may be used, where it is the practice, on Gaudete Sunday (Third Sunday of Advent) and on Laetare Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent) [GIRM 346f].

When Does Advent Begin and End?

Advent begins with the Sunday falling on or closest to 30 November and ends before Christmas [Norms 40]. What Is the Role of Sundays in Advent?

There are four Sundays of Advent. The General Norms state: The Sundays of this season are named the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Sundays of Advent [Norms 41]. We have already mentioned that the Third Sunday of Advent has a special name--Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is the Latin word for "Rejoice," which is the first word of the introit of the Mass for this day. The Church ascribes particular importance to these Sundays, and they take precedence over other liturgical celebrations.

How Is Music Performed During Advent?

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal notes: In Advent the use of the organ and other musical instruments should be marked by a moderation suited to the character of this time of year, without expressing in anticipation the full joy of the Nativity of the Lord.

Is the Gloria Said or Sung During Advent?

Neither. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal provides: [The Gloria or "Glory to God in the highest"] is sung or said on Sundays outside Advent and Lent, and also on Solemnities and Feasts, and at particular celebrations of a more solemn character [GIRM 53].

<u>What Private Devotions Can We Use to Grow Closer to God During Advent?</u> There are a variety of private devotions that the Church has recognized for use during Advent. The most famous is the Advent Wreath.





ATTENDANCE DUES

The whanau of every child enrolled in a State Integrated school like St Joseph's has to pay Attendance Dues to the Diocese. This is \$444 at the moment. For some families this is an impossible amount to pay but parishioners may be able to help. We have a great little school here and no child should be unable to attend because of the lack of family financial resources. An anonymous donation to the Diocesan Charity earmarked for Attendance Dues at St Joseph's will be used to support a child who needs help. The donation could be for the whole amount for a child or a contribution. As this is a charitable donation the donor can claim tax back at the end of the year.

Attendance Dues are not the same as the fees payable to the School. Attendance Dues must be paid to the Diocese. Sports Fees and other costs (overnight camps) are payable to the school. Next year we will not be asking for the donation per child or per family, as our school has opted into the Government's Donation Scheme.

We will need to charge for Sports Fees as the School receives invoices from the various sports affiliations (North King Country Junior Hockey, North King Country Junior Football, North King Country Miniball etc.) that needs payment. They charge for students to play the various sports, just like you would pay to play for a club.

STUDENT STATIONERY 2020

In 2020 the process of providing your student/s stationery for the year will be different to how we did it in the past. *No stationery packs will be available from the school*. We will keep a small amount of individual items in stock should your student need an item immediately, but will not be making up packs. We will provide the necessary to them, and invoice you for it via our Student Management System.

We use Officemax as we have an All of Government agreement with them to provide us with more reasonable prices than other stationery providers and the Back to School order is considered bulk buying which also keep prices low. Officemax, our stationery provider will be supplied with the lists, compiled by the teachers, for the different year groups.

The process will be as follows:

*You will be provided with an internet link and password which will take you to the website containing the lists for our school.

*You will be able to order the stationery from Officemax direct and have the stationery sent to your home. *Payment will be made directly to Officemax via Credit or Debit card. The school will not be collecting money for student stationery packs.

Should you wish to purchase the items on the list at another store, it is your choice. We ask that you please ensure that you student/s are equipped with the necessary stationery they are going to need for their learning by February 10th, 2020. This is five (5) days after we start school.
