Changes to Year 8 School Based Immunisation Programme for 2017

Following recent changes to the National Immunisation Schedule the school based immunisation programme will be offering Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine to boys as well as girls in Year 8. This is a two dose vaccine programme with a 6 month gap between the doses.

Information on the vaccine and consent forms will be sent home with your child in early 2017, for you to fill out and return to the school.
