Whanaungatanga

Kia ora Whanau, Community Members and Friends of Eltham School

We are introducing PB4L (School Wide).

PB4L School-Wide looks at behaviour and learning from a whole-of-school as well as an individual child perspective. The framework is based on international evidence.

The Positive Behaviour for Learning School-Wide framework, otherwise known as PB4L School-Wide, is helping New Zealand schools build a culture where positive behaviour and learning is a way of life. The framework can be tailored to your school's own environment and cultural needs.

It's not about changing the students; it's about changing the environment, systems and practices you have in place to support them to make positive behaviour choices.

PB4L School-Wide is based on the Positive Behavioural Interventions and Supports (PBIS) framework developed at the University of Oregon in the 1990s. PBIS is now in thousands of schools across the United States and there are over 700 School-Wide schools in New Zealand.

PB4L takes 3-5 years to integrate fully. This year we are focusing on tier one. Our teachers, Leadership team, other professionals we work closely with, and BoT will be taking part in the training. We are looking forward to the positive outcomes we expect from the programme.

Other major objectives we are working on this year include having a continued focus on the acceleration of our priority learners. Explicit teaching for our priority learners benefits everyone, and we are still working with an external faciliator who is upskilling us in accelerative practices, and data analysis to inform teaching practice. We are committed to reflecting on our practice on a regular basis to evaluate and improve teaching methods and systems that will produce postive outcomes for our students.

Is it Bullying?

When someone says or does something unintentionally hurtful and they do it once, that's rude

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they do it once, that's mean

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they keep doing it even when you tell them to stop or show them that you're upset that's bullying.

At Eltham School we work really hard to deal effectively with bullying behaviour. All schools have to deal with children who are bullies, and with children who are bullied. We need your support to deal with this effectively. Too often there is a misunderstanding around what bullying actually is and what it is not. At Eltham School we adopt the definition of bullying stated above in blue.

Bullying is a 'community problem' and it requires 'community action'. We need to work together to address the problem. Doing nothing only allows negative and inappropriate behaviours to continue.

We take all communication about bullying seriously from both children and adults. If we are not informed of specifics then we cannot act, so please let us know if you do witness bullying behaviour or incidents that happen that we may not know about.

Frequently children are great communicators of 'what has happened to them' at school, but they can be selective about what they tell their parents. They often leave out details about their contribution in behaviour incidents. We are usually able to provide a balanced view of what interactions have taken place between children and nearly always there are other children present who were witnesses to incidents. We collect our evidence from a range of sources and can provide accurate accounts of events in most circumstances.

Some useful advice to parents: When your child tells you about what happened to them at school today, make sure the next thing you say to them is "what did you do to that person?". Try not to show any level of emotion because your body language will determine their next response. If you are adamant your child is being honest when they reply, "nothing" and this behaviour towards them has been ongoing, then you need to come and talk to your child's teacher or a senior leader.
